to normal celebrations. This creates concerns with a higher chance of COVID-19 spreading when people are together for a lengthened period of time.



Construction Causes Concern for Students

After a delay of several weeks, the GLHS parking lot construction began in early December, and phase two will be ready to start sometime during the

holiday break. The construction itself is being done to create a new band room, with the old band room being used as a choir room, and the old choir room used as storage space.

While this construction will benefit students in the long run, many students feel upset about it. 26% of students polled said they would rather have everything stay the same than have construction done on it at all and another 48% found it inconvenient. Students voiced several complaints about the new, albeit temporary, changes, with several mentioning having to arrive early.

"As a student that plays an instrument, I already have had to make the choice to show up to school very early to get a parking spot in the band lot. I could not imagine walking a far distance with my instrument every day in the winter months," one band student

Several students suggested that the construction start in the summer when school is out rather than winter, but the reason the parking lot construction

is starting in the middle of the school year is that the construction will take a full calendar year to complete. This means that seniors dealing with the parking situation won't be here to see it's benefits.

'We're anticipating a November end right now," Dr. Wright said on the 2022 end date.

Students not only complained about having to arrive earlier in the morning but also about leaving for lunch. The combination of having to drive slower in winter road conditions and having to walk farther away from the school could lead to more students being late.

"At times I'll have a spot then leave for lunch and someone took my spot and now I have to park far away and possibly be late," a student who finds the construction inconvenient said.

"The students that can drive won't have enough time to get to and from lunch when they have to park farther away and are expected to be on time to class," another said, "They barely have time as it is to get food and actually eat it."

While several students strongly dislike the construction, some are in support of the new band room, as it gives more space to choir and band students.

"I'm happy that I will get to be in the band room now," said a student with a more positive perspective on the parking lot, "I'm in choir, and the choir classes will move to the band room when the new band room is built due to construction."

Administration has heard the complaints of those inconvenienced by the decreased parking spaces and wants students to know that they have done everything in their power to maximize the amount of parking space available during construction. There were plans to save two lanes from the main student lot, though this idea fell through in the end. Despite this loss, Dr. Wright did as much as he could to ensure there would be enough parking spaces for students with the softball and Marsh lots.

"I actually went out this summer and counted all of the parking spaces in the different lots... so that we'd actually have parking available for everybody," Dr. Wright said.

Overall, the construction is a divisive issue that will continue to unfold as we enter the new year.

Elisabeth V. works with a local medical supply company as their buyer. Elisabeth believes that a "smoothly running supply chain helps keep your cost down and your productivity up." She went on to say "When you have no supply, you have to pay... upcharges."

"What you need to know to stay ahead of the supply chain crisis" and "No Turkey this Year?!?" are the types of headlines that have been plastered on billboards, repeated in commercials, and reported by news stations with a frenzy since the beginning of the holiday season. From candy bars to ketchup, the media is here to help you find places to get what you need.

These types of ads may seem helpful, but in actuality, they are exacerbating the issue.

"It's creating a false panic... making people panic shop," Elisabeth also remarked.

In the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic, shelves of toilet paper were cleared and entire gas stations were cleaned out due to panic buying, and Elisabeth blames the media for it. While it may seem like a convenient story, all it is doing is "creating more demand in a tight supply situation which makes the situation worse."

COVID-19 has been the supply chain's biggest foe. Many people don't realize that the impact is made a great deal worse by staffing issues mostly due to the pandemic.

Short staffing due to COVID-19 has impacted the supply chain the greatest.

"Without labor, you don't have people... spending money."

The supply chain may not seem like an issue that affects young people and many people around the world don't realize that it directly affects every single person who consumes goods. Elisabeth spoke on that saying, "The supply chain affects everybody." She also gave an example saying, "Texas's freeze storm from February is still impacting plastic production to this day."



Biden Signs Trillion Dollar Infastructure bill

On Monday, Nov. 15, President Joe Biden signed a one trillion dollar bipartisan infrastructure bill giving money to much-needed areas in the United States.

President Joe Biden signed this bill on the White House South Lawn with over 800 government officials including governors, members of Congress, local, and state officials all gathered in crowd to watch.

So where is all this money going exactly? The money is to be distributed relatively evenly. \$550 billion will go to transportation, utilities, and broadband which will expand internet access to more Americans and be much more cost effective for most Americans. This internet expansion is one of the first infrastructure internet bills recognized by the United States. This is due to the increasing use of the internet in jobs. \$10 billion will go to bridges, roads, and other large projects. \$66 billion will go to railway upgrades and public transit. This bill also will provide over 400,000 Americans with clean water by replacing lead transporting pipes like the ones seen in Flint, Michigan.

Democrats hope this will bring up Biden's approval ratings as well as benefit millions of Americans.

However, some Republicans who have interacted with the bills have not been happy. The high price tag on this package has caused some Republican voters to send death threats. For instance, a 64-year-old man was arrested for threatening political officials about this bill. This caused Biden's approval ratings to take a dent. This bill is only a small portion of a bigger infrastructure for Americans presented by Democrats. With the current inflation rate, however, the goal of pumping money into infrastructure could see a negative impact on an already 40% inflation rate acording to the USA CPI index just starting in 2020. This inflation and money pumping are why Republi-

cans are very conflicted on this bill.

Of course 2021 had its downfalls too, including natural disasters, mass casualties, and shortages across the globe. We can't forget about January 6th, the day masses of people rioted at the United States Capital over Congress voting to approve Joe Biden as the winner of the 2020 presidential election.

Hurricane Ida was a category four Atlantic hurricane that affected Cuba, Louisiana, the Gulf Coast of the United States, as well as the East Coast. Hurricane Ida lasted around a week, taking place from August

26th to Sept. 4, according to fema.gov.

Tragedy occurred at the Astroworld Festival in Houston in early November.

Upwards of 300 people were treated at a field hospital set up near the location. At least ten people didn't survive out of the 50,000 that had attended the music festival.

Supply shortages have been an issue across the world ever since the pandemic began. The problem began with toilet paper during the very first quarantine, and has expanded to include many more products. Shortages and delays are likely going to affect this year's holiday season.

On a more positive note, the United States officially made Juneteenth a federal holiday. Juneteenth celebrates the freedom of enslaved people in the United States at the end of the Civil War.

Misogyny is now known as a hate crime in England and Wales after the murder of Sarah Everard in London. Helen Newlove, an activist in the United Kingdom, fought for the law to be put into place for months. In the end her efforts were successful.

Kamala Harris made history as the first female, Black, and South-Asian Vice President of the United States, partnered with Joe Biden in the 2020 election. Specifically in positive Grand Ledge news, the Girls Varsity Volleyball team won their District Championship for the first time since 1999, beating Dewitt in four sets at East Lansing High School. They proceeded to fall to Brighton High School in just three sets in the first round of regionals.

This event hits close to home, as it occured just over an hour and a half away in Oxford, Michigan.



"2021 was a recovery year. We adjusted to our new normal and it was definitely a year of growing pains" Senior Alyssa Rainsberger stated.


Here's to hoping that 2022 can surprise us all, and life can go back as we once knew it, or even improve from where society is right now.

Poland

Christmas in Poland differs from that of other countries. In December, Poland celebrates two important holidays: St. Nicholas Day and Christmas. Most of Poland's population is Roman-Catholic, making Christmas a very important religious holiday.

"Around 90% of the population is Roman-Catholic in Poland, so Christmas is an important time for a lot of families," Polish foreign exchange-student Oliwia Koscielska said.

On St. Nicholas day, people put Christmas stockings in their homes, and in the morning children that have behaved well can find some sweets inside while others find a lump of coal. Then, kids write letters to St. Nicholas about good things they've done this year and what gifts they'd like to find under the Christmas tree.

The first day of Christmas that's celebrated is Dec. 24. This day is called Wigilia, and it is when families get together to spend time together and eat a Christmas dinner. The tradition is to start eating when the first star appears in the sky. Before that, families share a host with everyone and exchange wishes for good health and life. People place a piece of hay underneath the table during this portion of the night.

"We also leave a free spot/an empty place at the table for an unexpected guest, someone who may not have anyone to spend Christmas with," Koscielska said.

The tradition is to have twelve dishes. Twelve is the number of wealth, number of apostles, and number of months in the year. The twelve dishes include: red borscht with mushroom mini dumplings (barszcz czerwony z uszkami), polish bigos, vegetable salad (jarzynowa sałatka), carp, salmon in aspic, polish pierogi with mushroom and cabbage, polish cheesecake, poppy seed cake (makowiec), wheat-flour and honey dessert (kutia), greece-styled cod and ginger-

Christmas carols always play in the background while eating. Gifts are opened after dinner, and at midnight some families go to the midnight mass in the church and celebrate Wigilia there.



Italy

Beatrice Arizzi, a forgeign exchange student from Italy, had pretty similar experiences with the holiday season in Italy that she did with America. The holiday that she celebrates is Christmas, which is what a large chunk of people here in the United States celebrate.

"We celebrate it because of religious importance, there are a lot of Christians in Italy," said Arizzi. Some unique traditions she has with her friends and family back in Italy is making gingerbread houses with her friends and decorating christmas trees.

Arizzi's favorite part of the holiday season is having a break from school and overall just getting to spend time with her family.

One of the most important food dishes in Italy is the Feast of the Seven Fishes. Seven different types of fish dishes are plated and served on Christmas Eve.

Another really important Italian tradition is The Nativity, which is where you set up the scene of baby Jesus's birth, except you don't put baby Jesus in until Christmas Day.

Similar to many other cultures and holiday traditions, Beatrice said the delicious food that gets made only during the holidays is one of the best parts. Most people can agree with her on that!

Share Holiday Traditions

Spain

Spain has some great traditions like many other countries too. Some of the major traditions in Spain are Christmas, Nochevieja, and Los Reves. For Christmas, Spanish people decorate neighborhoods, homes, shops ect... with decorations that are similar to the ones in the America.

An important thing that families and shops set up is a belen (nativity scene) in their windows during this time. It is a very important decoration that is always put on since Spain is a Catholic country. A belen is a set of figures that represent the birth of baby Jesus.

On the day before Christmas (Nochebuena), families gather and have a nice meal together containing simple traditional foods like Spanish ham, grilled prawns, crusty bread, and much more.

On the 25th, there is usually a family lunch that includes seafood, roasted lamb, and vegetables. Unlike in America, children do not receive gifts on Christmas. They usually get them on the sixth of January.

Nochevieja (New Years Eve) is a big deal in Spain. Everyone gathers to have a nice meal together with family and friends. When midnight approaches, 12 grapes are passed out to people to eat 12 seconds before midnight arrives. Whoever eats the 12 grapes before the new year gets goodluck for the rest of the

"We watch this program that is popular in Spain that starts around 10 p.m.," Alejandro Almagro Fuello, a foreign exchange student at Grand Ledge Highschool stated. "At 11:59 the bells start ringing 12 seconds before the New Year and we start eating a grape each second which is supposed to give us goodluck for the New Year."

When the new year comes, there is another tradition that is celebrated, Los Reyes (Epiphany).

"It's when the magic kings arrives and we get presents" Jose Miguel Melendez Alvarez said, a foreign exchange student at Grand Ledge High school.


On the day of Reyes, children receive gifts from the three wisemen Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. On the day before, there are parades everywhere and festivities. The kids before they go to bed prepare treats for los reyes and the camels that accompanied the reyes.



"After receiving gifts in the morning our family gathers and goes to a restaurant or to somebody's house and we eat together and that's how we celebrate the end of Christmas" Almagro Fuello said.

In the afternoon, families also gather around to take a piece of Roscon de Reyes (special cake for three kings day). In the roscon, there is a figurine of baby Jesus and a lima bean. Whoever finds baby Jesus will have good luck throughout the year, but whoever finds the lima bean has to buy next year's roscon.

"I think it's fun that the holiday season extends into January. I also just like sharing this cultural topic with students because many of them have never heard of it before" Mrs. Dietzel said, a spanish teacher at Grand Ledge High school.



France

Like other countries, France celebrates traditions that are unique to this country.

One of the many things that are done starting Dec.1st is a Calendrier m de l'avent (advent calendars). Calendrier m de l'avent is very popular during the holiday season. An advent calendar is a calendar that is used on the month of Dec. to get people exited for Christmas. Everyday a piece of the calendar is opended and a toy or candy will appear.

On the night before Christmas, there's a special meal called Le Reveillon de Noel. Family and friends gather with one another to enjoy stuffed chestnut turkey, oysters, foie gras and much more.

"This meal can go on for 3 hours," Madame Sowel, a French teacher at the high school, stated.

For dessert, a very popular and traditional treat called Buche de Noel (Yule Log) is made and bought by many families. It is a chocolate cake rolled up and decorated to mimic a log..

"I make the Bushe de Noel, the Christmas cake, every Christmas for dinner on Christmas day," said Madame Sowel.

France also celebrates Epiphany. In french it is called La Fetes Des Rois. French families make or buy this special tart called La Galette Des Rois.

Inside the galette, there is a porcelain object called feve. It is hidden inside the galette and whoever finds the feve gets to be crowned "king or queen" for the day. The "king or queen" throughout the day get to wear their crown and choose someone to join them in their reign of the day.

Other French traditions are the meal Le Reveillon de Noel to Fetes Des Rois. All are very significant to




The Holidays are a time for food, music, movies and family. Most importantly are the movies on the Hallmark Channel. The Hallmark Channel features Holiday and Christ-





Die Hard IS a Holiday Movie

Christmas, Mr. John McClane.

One of the main deciders of theme in a movie is the score. You might not realize it's there, but the music that plays in the background often changes your perception of what you're viewing. 
